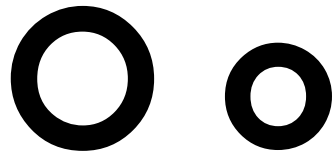

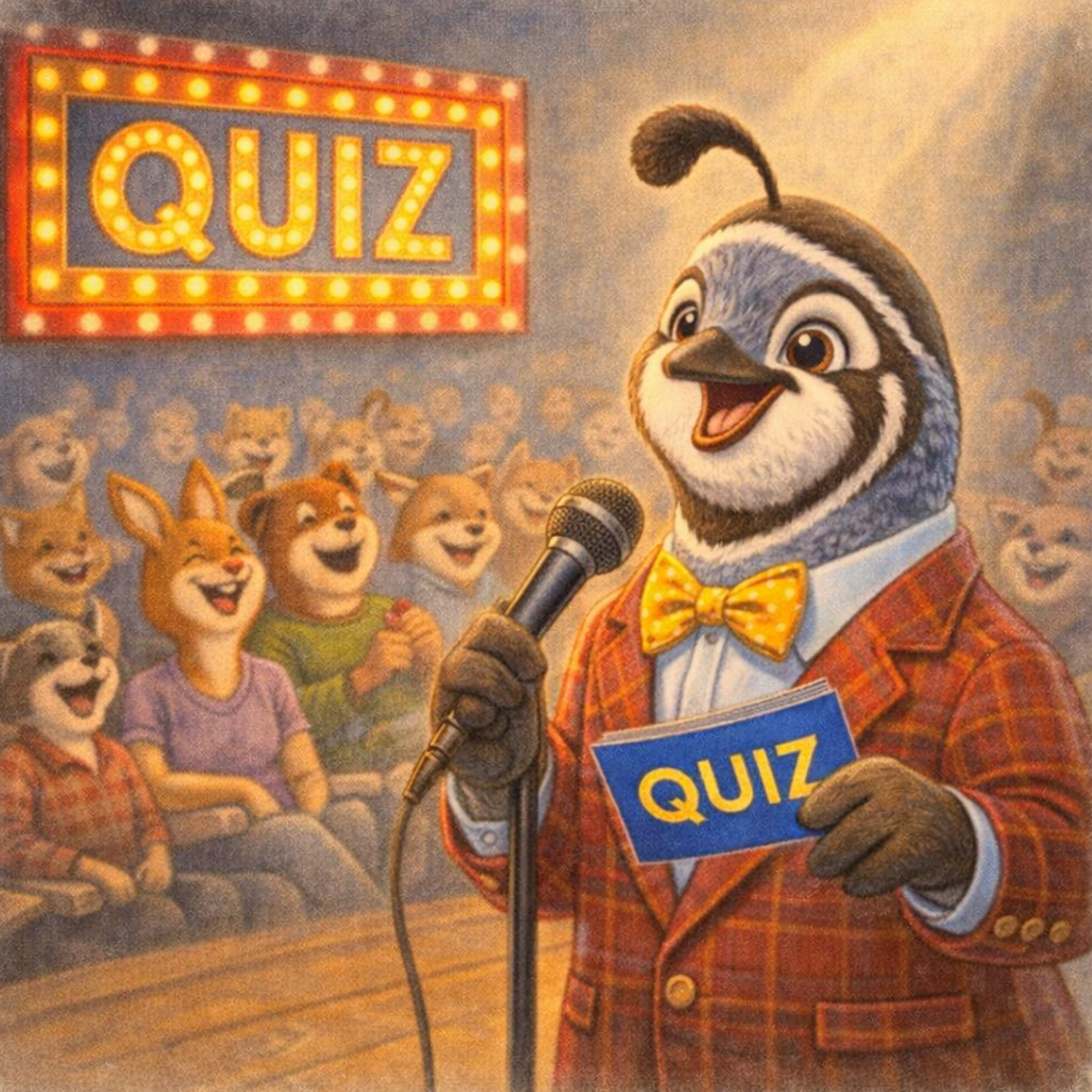

Educational Resource Guide

The Not So Ordinary Alphabet Book is a rich, playful, and purposeful literacy resource designed to spark curiosity, expand vocabulary, and support inclusive classroom learning. Through humour, alliteration, animal characters, and real-world occupations, each letter introduces children to language structures, identity, and meaningful roles in society in an engaging and memorable way.

The book draws inspiration from the structure of the NATO phonetic alphabet to support clear sound–letter connections, while reimagining it through playful, inclusive storytelling. This familiar structural approach helps strengthen phonemic awareness and recall, while shifting the focus from uniformity to creativity, individuality, and self-expression.

Each character in *The Not So Ordinary Alphabet Book* is intentionally designed to be unique. Characters differ in personality, interests, strengths, and ways of engaging with the world. Some are bold and energetic, others calm and reflective; some lead, some support, some create, and others problem-solve quietly. No character is presented as “typical” or “perfect”, reinforcing the message that there is no single way to learn, work, or belong.

The book actively supports inclusion and representation. Characters are written to challenge stereotypes and reflect a diverse range of identities and experiences, including neurodivergent-coded characters, gender-inclusive roles, non-stereotypical occupations, and characters who use mobility aids such as a wheelchair. These characters are not defined by limitation, but by their capabilities, interests, and contributions, promoting a strengths-based understanding of diversity.

The Not So Ordinary Alphabet Book is ideal for Early Childhood, Early Stage 1, and Stage 1 classrooms, with flexible opportunities for extension in older year levels. It supports literacy development while also fostering empathy, identity exploration, and respectful discussion about difference — making it not only an alphabet book, but a tool for connection, understanding, and belonging.

Key Literacy Concepts Explored

Alliteration & Sound Awareness

Each character is carefully crafted using repeated initial sounds (e.g. *Bravo the Baboon, brilliant baker*), helping students to:

- Recognise letter–sound relationships
- Develop phonemic awareness
- Hear rhythm and flow in language
- Build confidence with early reading and speaking

Teaching ideas

- Highlight the repeated sound and brainstorm new words together
- Create class alliteration charts
- Invite students to invent their own alliterative name and animal

Discussion prompt questions

Use these prompts during read-alouds, small groups, or circle time to deepen understanding and oral language:

- What sound do you hear at the beginning of this character’s name?
- Can you think of another word that starts with the same sound?
- How does it feel when we say the words together — fast, fun, bouncy, smooth?
- Why do you think the author chose these words for this character?
- Which word was your favourite to say? Why?
- Can you clap or tap the beat of the repeated sound?

Extension discussion (for Early Stage 1 / Stage 1)

- What would happen if we changed the animal but kept the sound?
 - How would the character change if we changed the occupation?
 - Can you think of an alliterative name for yourself? How does it sound when you say it out loud?

Rich Vocabulary Development

The text intentionally includes advanced and descriptive vocabulary (e.g. *pragmatic, zealous, resourceful, extraordinary*), encouraging students to:

- Develop exposure to Tier 2 and Tier 3 vocabulary
- Make meaning through context and illustration cues
- Expand oral language and expressive vocabulary

Teaching ideas

- Discuss new words using visuals, actions, and facial expressions
- Create a class “Word Wall of Wonders” to display interesting or powerful words
- Encourage students to use one new word in a sentence, drawing, or oral response

Discussion prompt questions

Use these prompts during read-alouds, guided groups, or vocabulary focus sessions:

- Did you hear a word that sounded new or interesting?
- What do you think that word might mean?
- What clues helped you work it out — the picture, the sentence, or both?
- Can you show what the word means using your body or face?
- Have you ever felt or seen something like this word before?
- Is this a word you might use again? When?

Extension discussion (for Early Stage 1 / Stage 1)

- How would the sentence change if we used a different word?
 - Can you think of a stronger or more exciting word to replace this one?
 - Which character do you think best matches this word? Why?
 - Can you use this word to describe yourself, a friend, or something in our classroom?

Occupations & Real-World Connections

Each letter introduces a profession, expanding students' understanding of the world and their place within it. Occupations include creatives, carers, scientists, leaders, helpers, and trades, encouraging children to see work as meaningful, varied, and connected to everyday life. This supports students to:

- Develop early career awareness
- Build respect for diverse roles in society
- Engage in discussions about interests, abilities, and strengths

Teaching ideas

- Match occupations in the book to community helpers and familiar roles
- Invite students to role-play different jobs using dress-ups or props
- Ask: *“What skills does this job need?”*

Discussion prompt questions

Use these prompts during shared reading, role-play activities, or class discussions:

- What job does this character have?
- What do you think this character does in their job?
- Why do you think this job is important?
- What tools, clothing, or equipment might this job need?
- Who in our community might have a similar job?
- Would you like to try this job? Why or why not?

Extension discussion (for Early Stage 1 / Stage 1)

- What skills or strengths would help someone do this job well?
 - How does this job help other people or the environment?
 - Could this job be done in different ways or places?
 - What job do you enjoy learning about the most so far?

Social & Emotional Learning

Teaching ideas

- Discuss how each character might be feeling and why

- Connect character traits to students' own experiences and identities

Discussion prompt questions

Use these prompts during read-alouds, circle time, or wellbeing lessons:

- How do you think this character is feeling right now?
- What clues help you understand their feelings?
- What do you notice about how this character treats others?
- What makes this character unique or special?
- How do you think the character feels about themselves?
- Have you ever felt the same way?

Extension discussion (for Early Stage 1 / Stage 1)

- What strategies does the character use to calm down or focus?
 - How does the character show kindness or care?
 - What strengths does this character have?
 - How are you similar to this character? How are you different?

- Develop creative storytelling skills
- Build visual literacy through interpretation of illustrations
- Practise prediction and inference

Teaching ideas

- Rewrite a page using a new occupation or setting
- Design a new “Not So Ordinary” character using a chosen letter
- Create short oral presentations, storyboards, or mini books

Discussion prompt questions

Use these prompts during shared reading, creative tasks, or group discussions:

- What do you notice first in the picture? Why do you think that is?
- What do you think might happen next? What clues helped you decide?
- How does the picture help tell the story?
- What makes this character funny, surprising, or interesting?
- If you could change one thing about the story, what would it be?

Extension discussion (for Early Stage 1 / Stage 1)

- How would the story change if it took place somewhere else?
 - What would happen if the character had a different job?
 - Can you create a new character that is “not so ordinary”?
 - How could you show your ideas using pictures, words, or actions?
